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1. IMPORTANT SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

When using your telephone equipment, basic safety precautions should alw ays be follow ed to reduce the risk of fire, electric shock and injury, including the follow ing:

- 1. Read and understand all the instructions.
- 2. Follow all w arnings and instructions marked on the product.
- 3. Unplug this product from the w all outlet before cleaning. Do not use liquid cleaners or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.
- 4. Do not use this product near water (for example, near a bath tub, kitchen sink, sw imming pool).
- Do not expose the telephone to direct sunlight or extreme cold environment. Do not put the telephone close to a heating source such as radiators, cookers, etc.
- Do not overload w all outlets and extension cords as this can result in the risk of fire or electric shock.
- 7. Unplug this product from the w all outlet and refer servicing to the distributor under the follow ing conditions:
 - When the pow er supply cord or plug is damaged or frayed.
 - If the product does not operate normally by follow ing the operating instructions.
 - If the product has been dropped and the cabinet has been damaged.
 - If the product exhibits a distinct change in performance.
- 8. Avoid using a telephone (other than a cordless type) during an electrical storm. There may be a remote risk of electric shock from lightning.
- 9. Do not use the telephone to report a gas leak in the vicinity of the leak.
- 10. Use only the supplied NiMH (Nickel Metal Hydride) battery pack! The operation periods for the handsets are only applicable with the default battery capacities
- 11. The use of other battery types or non-rechargeable batteries/primary cells can be dangerous. These may cause interference and/or unit damages. The manufacturer will not be held liable for damage arising from such non-compliance.
- 12. Do not use third party charging bays. The battery may be damaged.
- 13. Battery should not be exposed to excessive heat such as bright sunshine or fire and immersed in water.
- 14. For pluggable equipment, the socket-outlet (power adaptor) shall be installed near the equipment and shall be easily accessible.

2. SET UP THE TELEPHONE

2.1 Package Contents

The package contains the follow ing items:

- Base station
- Corded handset
- Cordless handset
- Charger with an AC pow er adapter
- AC pow er adapter (for base unit)
- NiMH rechargeable battery pack (for handset)
- Telephone line cord (for base unit)
- User's manual

2.2 Location

For maximum coverage and reduce the interference, here are some guidelines you should consider when you place the base unit,

- place it at a convenient, high, and central location with no obstructions betw een the handset and base unit in an indoor environment.
- place it aw ay from electronic appliances such as televisions, microwave ovens, radios, personal computers, wireless devices or other cordless phones.
- avoid facing radio frequency transmitters, such as external antennas of mobile phone cell stations.
- avoid plugging it into the same circuit as other major household electrical appliances because of the potential for interference. Try moving the appliance or the base unit to another pow er outlet.

If the reception for a base unit location is not satisfactory, move it to another location for better reception.

Depending on the surrounding conditions as well as spatial and structural factors, the range may be reduced. The range indoors is normally less than outdoors.

2.3 Connect the Corded Base Station


Plug one end of the telephone line cord into a telephone jack or a DSL filter.

If you have DSL highspeed Internet service, a DSL filter (not included) is required.

Route the telephone line cord through this slot.

Click the wall mount bracket securely into the mounting slots for tabletop use.

Plug the other end of the telephone line cord into the telephone jack on the back of the telephone base.



- Plug the large end of the telephone base pow er adapter into a pow er outlet.


Route the pow er adapter cord through this slot.

Plug the small end of the telephone base pow er adapter into the pow er adapter jack on the back of the telephone base.

Plug the corded handset cord into the corded handset jack on the back of the telephone base.

NOTE

• Use only the pow er adapter supplied with the base station.



2.4 Install and Charge the Handset Battery



1. Plug the battery connector securely into the socket inside the handset battery compartment. Insert the supplied battery as indicated.



- 2. Align the cover flat against the battery compartment, and then slide it upw ards until it clicks into place.
- 3. Charge the handset by placing it face forward in the charger. You hear a beep when the handset is charging in the charger.

NOTES

- Use only the supplied NiMH rechargeable battery pack.
- If you do not use the handset for a long time, disconnect and remove the battery to prevent possible leakage.




2.5 Base Station Installation options

Your telephone base is ready for tabletop use. If you want to mount your telephone on a wall, follow the steps to connect the telephone base with a standard dual-stud telephone wall mounting plate. You may need a professional to install the mounting plate.

25.1 Tabletop to Wall Mount Installation


- 1. Unplug the pow er adapter from the pow er outlet. Unplug the telephone line cord from the w all jack (or DSL filter).
- 2. Put the corded handset aside. Hold dow n the switch hook on the telephone base, and then slide the handset tab upw ards to remove it from the slot. Rotate the handset tab by 180 degrees. Then, replace the handset tab into the slot until it locks into position.
- 3. Press dow n on the tabs of the w all mount bracket to release it from tabletop orientation.
- 4. Rotate the w all mount bracket dow n and push it into the telephone base until it clicks into place.
- 5. Plug the telephone line cord (or DSL filter) into the w all jack. Plug the pow er adapter into a pow er outlet. Align the slots on the back of the telephone base w ith the studs of the w all mounting plate.
- 6. Slide the telephone base dow n until it locks securely. Bundle the telephone line cord and pow er adapter cord neatly with twist ties.


2.5.2 Wall Mount to Tabletop Installation

- 1. Unplug the pow er adapter from the pow er outlet. Unplug the telephone line cord from the w all jack (or DSL filter). If the telephone line cord and pow er adapter cord are bundled, untie them first. Push the telephone base up to remove it from w all.
- Put the corded handset aside. Hold dow n the switch hook on the telephone base, and then slide the handset tab upw ards to remove it from the slot. Rotate the handset tab by 180 degrees. Then, replace the handset tab into the slot until it locks into position.
- Gently pull upw ard to release the w all mount bracket. Rotate the w all mount bracket up to tabletop position and push it into the telephone base until it clicks into place.
- 4. Plug the telephone line cord (or DSL filter) into the wall jack. Plug the power adapter into an pow er outlet. Bundle the telephone line cord and pow er adapter cord neatly with twist ties if necessary.



3. GET TO KNOW YOUR PHONE

3.1 Overview of the Handset



1 Incoming Call light

Flashes red slow ly when receiving an incoming call.

2. Earpiece

3. Charger/Booster LED (

- Steady red when the handset battery is charging.
- Long flashes in red when the handset battery is low.
- Flashes red quickly when handset registration is in progress.
- Flashes red slow ly when the handset is not registered or not in charger.
- Steady blue when the booster function is activated.

4. Photo speed dial keys

Your handset has four photo speed dial keys. It retrieves the same set of photo or Direct Memory speed dial entries stored in the AMPLIDECT295 or AMPLIDECT COMBI 295. Press to dial a preset number.



- 5. Talk ON / Flash (
- Light Green when the handset is on earpiece mode.
- During a call, Press to access Recall feature (R).

6. TALKOFF (

- Hang up a call.
- Silence the ringer temporarily while the phone is ringing.
- Mute the paging tone.



- Make or answ era call using the speakerphone.
- Sw itch between the speakerphone and the earpiece.
- Light Orange when on speakerphone mode.



3. RING light

Flashes when there is an incoming call. Steadily on when the answering machine is turned on. Flashes when there are new memos or messages in the answ ering machine.

4. MENU/OK

In idle mode: Press to access the main menu. In sub-menu mode: Press to confirm the selection. In Redial list / Call list: Press to store the number into Phonebook.

5. C PHONEBOOK

In Idle: Press to access the phonebook.

A CALLS (CALL LIST) In Idle mode: Press to access the call list.

7. INT/MUTE/CLEAR

In main menu mode: Press to go back to idle screen.

In sub-menu mode: Press to go back to previous level.

In sub-menu mode: Press and hold to go back to idle screen.

In editing / predialing mode: Press to clear a character / digit.

In editing / predialing mode: Press and hold to delete all the characters / digits.

During a call: Press to mute / unmute the microphone.

In ringing: Press to silence the base ringer.

In idle mode: Press to intercom another system handset.

8. MEMORY KEYS (3 PHOTO SPEED DIAL KEYS; 1 MEMORY KEY - M4)

In idle mode: Dial your phone number and <u>press and hold the memory key</u> until to hear a beep.

To use: Press to dial out to the number stored in the memory key.

9. VOLUMEBOOST

During a call: Press to activate/deactivate the VOLUME BOOST function.

10. SPEAKER

In Idle mode or Phonebook/ Call list/ Redial list view mode: Press to make a call with speakerphone.

11. ALPHANUMERIC KEYPAD, STAR¥, HARSH

In predial or editing mode: Press to insert a digit / character/L/ J 0 key in predial or editing mode: Press and hold to insert a pause.

12. NAVIGATION KEYS

UP (▲)

In menu mode: Press to scroll up the menu items.

In Phonebook list / Redial list / Call list: Press to scroll up the list. In editing mode: Press to move the cursor one character to the left. During a call or TAM message playback: Press to increase the volume.

REPEAT/OGM (

In Idle mode: Press and hold to record OGM.

Press to playback OGM.

In TAM message playback mode: Press to go back to previous message.

MEMO/SKIP FORWARD (>>)

In Idle mode: Press and hold to record a memo.

In TAM message playback mode: Press to skip to next message.

DOWN/REDIAL LIST (🖓)

In idle mode: Press to access the redial list.

In menu mode: Press to scroll dow n the menu items.

In Phonebook list / Redial list / Call list view mode: Press to scroll down the list.

In editing mode: Press to move the cursor one character to the right.

During a call or TAM message playback: Press to decrease the volume.

In Idle: Press to switch the answering machine ON or OFF.

13. PLAY/STOP

In idle mode: Press to playback messages. During TAM message playback: Press to stop playing messages.

14. DELETE

In TAM message playback mode: Press to delete the current TAM message playback.

In idle mode: Press and hold to delete all old messages.

15. RECALL

During a call: Press to activate Recall for use with Telephone Network Services

such as Call Waiting during a call.

During message playback: Press to call back the caller if the caller's number is

available.



3.6 Text and Digit Entry Table

The follow ing tables show you where each letter and punctuation character can be found. This will be helpful when storing a name in the phonebook or renaming your handset.

In editing mode, a cursor is displayed to indicate the current text entry position. It is positioned at the right of the last character entered.

Writing Tips:

- 1. Once a character is selected, the cursor will move to the next position after a short pause.
- 2. You can move the cursor within the text by $\blacktriangle \forall$ to amend the text entry.
- 3. Press CANCEL/MUTE (a) on the handset, or INT/MUTE/CLEAR on the telephone base, to delete the last character.
- 4. <u>Press and hold CANCEL/MUTE</u> (m) on the handset, or INT/MUTE/CLEAR on the telephone base, to delete the entire text string.

4. USE YOUR PHONE

4.1 Make an External Call

4.1.1 Preparatory Dialing

Using the base:

Enter the phone number and lift the corded handset or press **SPEAKER** to dial the number. Press **INT/MUTE/CLEAR** to clear the entry when entering the number.

4.1.2 Direct Dialing

Using the base:

Lift the corded handset or press **SPEAKER** to take the line and enter the phone number.

4.1.3 Call from the Phonebook

Using the base:

Press **PHONEBOOK** to access the phonebook and press \blacktriangle to select the desired

phonebook entry. Lift the corded handset or press **SPEAKER (**) to dial out to the selected phonebook entry.

USE YOUR PHONE

4.1.4 Call from the Call List

Using the base:

Press **A** CALLS to access the call list and press **A**/▼ to select the desired call list entry. Lift the corded handset or press **SPEAKER** to dial out to the selected call list entry.

4.1.5 Call from the Redial List

Using the base:

Press P to access the redial list and press \blacktriangle to select the desired redial number. Lift the corded handset or press **SPEAKER** \clubsuit to dial out to the selected redial number.

4.1.6 Call Timer

Your base automatically times the duration of each call. The call timer will display a few seconds after the call has ended. It is show n in hours, minutes and seconds format (HH:MM: SS).

4.2 Make a Call from Direct Access Memory

Using a handset:

On the handset, press and hold the picture memory until to hear a beep after about 3 seconds.

Or

Press > and press on the picture memory to dial the number pre-stored into the keys respectively.

Using the base:

In idle mode, press any direct memory key in which a number is stored, the phone will automatically dial out the telephone number stored in the selected memory key in speakerphone mode.

OR

Lift the corded handset or press **SPEAKER**, and then press any direct memory key in which a number is stored to dial the number pre-stored into the keys respectively.

NOTES:

- You need to set the direct access number first. See Section 7.1 for details.
- If no number is stored, you will hear beeps.

4.3 Answer a Call

Using a handset:

If the handset is not on the charging cradle:

When the phone rings, press \frown or \blacktriangleleft) to answ er a call. Press it again to turn on the speakerphone.

If the handset is on the charging cradle: When the phone rings, pick up the handset to answ era call.

Using the base:

When there is an incoming ring, pick up the corded handset or press SPEAKER

▲) to answ er the call.

4.4 Volume Boost Function

The Volume Boost function allows you to amplify the handset earpiece volume to compensate for the ear's limited sensitivity.

Using a handset:

To turn on the Volume Boost function:

During a call, when in boost mode, you can increase the listening volume up to 30dB amplification.

- Press and Hold (2 seconds) the VOL+ button to activate Boost mode (LED will be steady blue).

To turn off the Volume Boost function and return the earpiece volume back to normal:

• Press and hold again the VOL+ button to cancel Boost mode. (LED will go Off).

NOTE:

The audio boost feature will be turned off automatically when the call is ended.

Using the base:

During a call, you can activate the Volume Boost function with the volume of earpiece increased by several dBs by pressing **AMPLIFY**, "BOOSTER ON" displays on the base screen. To cancel it, press **AMPLIFY** again.

4.5 End a Call

Using a handset:

During a call, press *f* to end the call.

OR

Put the cordless handset on the charging cradle to end the call.

Using the base:

During a call, put the corded handset on the base station to end the call.

OR

Press **SPEAKER** (i) if you have a call in speakerphone mode.

4.6 Adjust Earpiece and Speakerphone Volume

There are 5 levels (VOLUME 1 to VOLUME 5) to choose from for each of earpiece and speakerphone volume.

Using a handset:

During a call:

Press Vol+ or Vol- to select your desired volume. When you end the call, the setting will remain at the last selected level.

Using the base:

During a call:

Press $\blacktriangle \forall$ to select volume 1-5. The current setting is show n. When you end the call, the settings will remain at the last selected level.

4.7 Mute a Call

With the call muted, you can talk to someone nearby without letting the caller hear you during a call.

Using the base:

During a call:

Press **INT/MUTE/CLEAR** to mute the microphone and "MUTED" is displayed on the LCD. Your caller cannot hear you. Press **INT/MUTE/CLEAR** again to resume the microphone.

4.8 Emergency Call without Main Power

The corded base unit can make an emergency call with the corded handset when the mains AC pow er is disconnected.

Pick up the corded handset and w ait for several seconds to get the dial tone and then enter the phone number to make a call.

REM ARK:

It is not possible to dial numbers from memories when the mains power is off.

When the mains pow er is off, you can also answer an incoming call with the corded handset.

When the phone rings, pick up the corded handset to talk to the caller.

4.9 Redial the Last Number

You can redial up to 10 of the last numbers called on the corded telephone base. If you have stored a name in the phonebook to match with the number, the name will be displayed instead. The most recently dialed number will be displayed at the top of the redial list.

4.9.1 Redial a Number from the Redial List

Using the base:

1. In idle mode, press \P to view the redial list.

OR

Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/∇ to select **CALL LOG**.

Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select DIALED. Press

MENU/OK to view the redial list.

- 2. Press $\checkmark \forall$ to brow se the redial list.
- 3. Pick up the corded handset or press **SPEAKER** ◀) to dial to the selected redial number.

NOTE:

If there are no numbers in the redial list, the display will show "EMPTY".

4.9.2 Store a Redial Number into the Phonebook

Using the base:

- 1. Follow Steps 1 and 2 in section 4.9.1.
- 2. Press MENU/OK to select ADD TO PB?
- 3. Press MENU/OK to enter the name.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to edit the number.
- 5. Press **MENU/OK** and \checkmark to select the melody.
- 6. Press MENU/OK to save the redial number into the phonebook.

4.9.3 Delete a Redial Number

Using the base:

- 1. Follow Steps 1 and 2 in section 4.9.1.
- Press MENU/OK and ▲ ▼to select DELETE?
- 3. Press MENU/OK to confirm.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to reconfirm. Delete the Entire Redial List

4.9.4 Delete the entire Redial list

Using the base:

- 1. Follow Steps 1 and 2 in section 4.9.1
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select DELETE ALL?
- 3. Press MENU/OK to confirm.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to reconfirm.

4.10 Find the Handset

This feature helps you find the misplaced handset(s).

You can locate the handset by operation on the base station as below .

- 1. In idle mode, press **MENU/OK** and $\blacktriangle/\blacksquare$ to select **PAGE ALL HS**.
- 2. Press MENU/OK to confirm. "PAGING" will flash on the base screen.

All the handsets registered to the base will produce the paging tone, and "PAGING" will flash on the screen. You can stop the paging by pressing ()/()/()/()/()

NOTE:

If there is an incoming call during paging, the phone will ring with the incoming call instead of paging.

4.11 Make an Internal Call

This feature allow s you to make internal calls, transfer external calls and make conference calls. If the called base or handset is not answered within 60 seconds, the called base or handset w ill stop ringing and the calling one w ill return to standby mode.

4.11.1 Intercom

Using the corded base:

- In idle mode, press INT/MUTE/CLEAR and ▲/▼ to select the handset you w ant to call.
- 2. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

NOTE:

If only one cordless handset is registered to the base station, press **INT/MUTE/CLEAR** will call the cordless handset immediately.

4.11.2 Call All Handsets

Using the corded base:

1. In idle mode, press INT/MUTE/CLEAR and press 9.

4.11.3 Transfer an External Call

Using the corded base:

During an external call:

- 1. Press **M ENU/OK** and **▲/▼** to select the desired handset you w ant to intercom with, then press **M ENU/OK**.
- 2. The external call is put on hold automatically and the called handset rings.
- 3. Press 🔨 or () on the called handset to establish an internal call.
- 4. Hang up the corded handset on the calling base to end the internal call.
- 5. The external call is transferred to the called handset.

4.11.4 Make a 3-way Conference Call

The conference call feature allow sone external call to be shared with the corded base and cordless handset or two cordless handsets. The three parties can share the conversation and no network subscription is required.

Using the corded base:

During the external call:

- 1. Follow Steps 1 to 4 in section 4.11.3.
- 2. Press and hold ¥ on the corded base to establish the conference call.

NOTE:

Any party (corded base or cordless handset) hangs up during a conference call will leave the other party still in connection with the external call.

5 PHONEBOOK

Your phone can store up to 50 private phonebooks in the cordless handset and the telephone base with names and numbers. Each phonebook entry can have a maximum of 20 digits for the phone number and 12 characters for the name. You can also

select different ringer tones for your phonebook entries. Phonebook entries are stored alphabetically by name.

5.1 Add a New Phonebook Entry

Using the base: In idle:

- 1. Press MENU/OK to select PHONEBOOK main menu item
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ★ to select ADD.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and enter the name.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and enter the number.
- 5. Press MENU/OK and ★ to select the desired ringtone for your phonebook entry.
- 6. Press **MENU/OK** to store the phonebook entry.

5.2 Search for a Phonebook Entry

Using the corded base:

In idle:

- 1. Enter the phonebook list.
- 2. Enter the first character of your desired name of the phonebook entries by multi-tap.

5.3 View a Phonebook Entry

Using the base:

In idle:

1. Press **PHONEBOOK** to display the first phonebook entry in alphabetical order.

OR

- 1. Press **MENU/OK** three times to display the first phonebook entry.
- 2. Enter the first character of your desired name of the phonebook entry by multi-tap.

OR

Press $\blacksquare \forall \forall$ to select and view the desired phonebook entry.

5.4 Edit a Phonebook Entry

Using the base: In idle:

- 1. Press MENU/OK to select PHONEBOOK main menu item
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select EDIT.

3. Press **MENU/OK** and the display will show the first phonebook entry in alphabetical order.

- Scroll ▲/▼ until you see the contact you want to edit and then press MENU/OK.
- 5. Edit the name with the key INT/MUTE/CLEAR and press MENU/OK.
- 6. Edit the number with the key INT/MUTE/CLEAR and press MENU/OK.
- 7. Press ▲/▼ to select your desired ringtone.
- 8. Press **MENU/OK** to confirm the setting.

5.5 Delete a Phonebook Entry

Using the base: In idle:

- 1. Press MENU/OK to select PHONEBOOK.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select DELETE.
- 3. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/∇ to select the desired phonebook entry.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and the display show s "CONFIRM?".
- 5. Press MENU/OK to confirm or INT/MUTE/CLEAR to cancel.

5.6 Delete the Entire Private Phonebook

Using the base:

In idle:

- 1. Press **MENU/OK** to select **PHONEBOOK**.
- 2. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/\forall button to select **DELETE ALL**.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and the display show s "CONFIRM?".
- 4. Press MENU/OK to confirm or INT/MUTE/CLEAR to cancel.

5.7 Check the Phonebook Usage

You can check how many phonebook entries have been occupied in your phone and how many phonebook entries are available for you to store in the phonebook.

Using the base:

In idle :

- 1. Press MENU/OK to select PHONEBOOK.
- Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select PB STATUS. The display show s XX/50 USED" (XX refer to the number of phonebook entries). Press INT/MUTE/CLEAR to Exit.

6 CALLER DISPLAY (NETWORK DEPENDENT)

This feature is available if you have subscribed the Caller Line Identification service with your network service provider. Your phone can store up to 20 received calls on the cordless handset and the telephone base with date/time information in the call list. The number will be show n on the LCD when the phone is ringing. If the number matches with one of the entries in your Private Phonebook, the caller's name stored in the private phonebook will be displayed with the number. The phone will ring with the melody associated with that phonebook entry.

If the caller number is disabled to send caller information, "WITHHELD" will be displayed.

If the call is an international call or with unknown number, "OUT OF AREA" will be displayed.

In standby, if three unansw ered calls are received, "3 CALLS" will be displayed.

6.1 View the Call List

All unansw ered calls are saved in calls log with the latest call putting at the top of the list. When the call list is full, the oldest call will be replaced by a new call. The unansw ered call which has not been read is marked with \bigstar icon.

Using the base:

1. Press ? CALLS to access the call list.

OR

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select CALL LOG.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select MISSED or RECEIVED.
- 3. Press MENU/OK to see the most recent record in the selected calls list.
- 4. Press ▲/▼ to scroll through the calls list.

6.2Store a Call List Number into the Phonebook

Using the base:

- 1. Follow Section 6.1 to access the call list.
- 2. Press MENU/OK to select ADD TO PB?
- 3. Press **MENU/OK** and enter the name.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and the selected call list number will be displayed.
- 5. Edit the number if necessary. Use the key $\rm INT/MUTE/CLEAR$ $\ensuremath{\overline{s}}$ to delete a number.
- 6. Press MENU/OK and ▲ ▼to select the melody.
- 7. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

6.3Delete an Entry in the Call List

Using the base:

- 1. Follow Section 6.1 to access the call list.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and then ▲ ▼to select DELETE?
- 3. Press MENU/OK to confirm.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to reconfirm.

6.4 Delete the Entire Call List

Using the base:

- 1. Follow Section 6.1 to access the call list.
- Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select DELETE ALL?
- 3. Press MENU/OK to confirm.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to reconfirm.

7 DIRECT MEMORY KEYS

You can store direct memory numbers (M1 to M4) in the corded base. Then, you can dial them directly from idle mode using the Photodect295.

7.1 Set Direct Memory Keys in Handset

On the Corded base

In idle mode:

- 1 Dial your phone number.
- 2 <u>Press and hold</u> the picture memory button to store the number entered from idle mode. You will hear a beep of confirmation.

8 PHONE SETTINGS

Your phone comes with a selection of settings that you can change to personalize your phone the way you like it to work.

8.1 Handset Settings

8.1.1 Set the Ringer Volume

You can set the ringer volume level. A total of 6 ringer volume levels including VOLUME OFF are provided for your selection.

Press on the key Vol + and Vol - to adjust the ringer volume in idle mode.

8.2 Base Settings using the Base

8.2.1 Clock Settings

You will need to set the correct date and time so that you know when you received answ ering machine messages or call list entries.

Using the base:

The format for the date is YYYY-MM-DD, and the time is HH:MM in either 12-hour or 24-hour format.

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select DATE & TIME.
- 2 Press MENU/OK to show TIME FORMAT. Select this if you want to change betw een 12-hour and 24-hour formats. Otherwise, press▲/▼ to show SET CLOCK.
- 3. Press **M ENU/OK** to confirm and the 4-digit year is displayed. Last two digits of the year will flash to ask for year input.
- 4. Press $\blacktriangle \nabla$ to set the year.
- 5. Press MENU/OK and the month field will flash to ask for month input.
- 6. Press $\checkmark \forall$ to set the month.
- 7. Press MENU/OK and the date field will flash to ask for date input.
- 8. Press $\checkmark \forall$ to set the date.
- 9. Press **MENU/OK** to and the hour field will flash to ask for hour input.
- 10. Press $\blacktriangle \forall$ to set the hour.
- 11. Press **MENU/OK** and the minutes field will flash to ask for minutes input.
- 12. Press $\blacktriangle \forall$ to set the minutes.
- 13. Press **M ENU/OK** to confirm and you will hear a beep with the display back to previous menu.

8.2.2 Set the Ringer Melody for Internal Calls

You can set special melody to personalize your base internal ringer. A total of 10 melodies are provided for your selection.

- 1. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/ \forall to select **SETTINGS**.
- 2. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/\forall to select **RING SETUP**.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select INT. RING.
- 4. Press **MENU/OK** and the display will show MELODY.
- 5. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/ \forall to select the desired ringer melody for internal calls.
- 6. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

NOTE:

The respective ringer melody will be played during your selection.

8.2.3 Set the Ringer Melody for External Calls

You can set special melody to personalize your base external ringer. A total of 10 melodies are provided for your selection.

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select SETTINGS.
- 2. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/\forall to select **RING SETUP**.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select EXT. RING.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and the display will show MELODY.
- 5. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select the desired ringer melody for external calls.
- 6. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

8.2.4 Set the Ringer Volume

You can adjust the volume level of the ringer for internal call (INT RING) and external call (EXT RING) separately, with settings from 1 (the quietest) to 5 (loudest), or set it to VOLUME OFF.

- 1. Follow steps from 1 to 3 in section 8.2.2 and 8.2.3
- Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select VOLUME.
- 3. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/∇ to select the desired volume level list.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

NOTE:

The respective ringer volume will be played during your selection. If VOLUME OFF is selected, play.

8.2.5 De-register a Handset

You will need to enter the 4-digit system PIN code in order to de-register a handset from the base station. (The default PIN is 0000.)

- 1. Press **MENU/OK** and $\blacktriangle \forall$ to select **SETTINGS**.
- 2. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/ \forall to select **DELETE HS**.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and you are requested to enter the 4-digit system PIN.
- 4. Enter the 4-digit system PIN.
- 5. Press **MENU/OK** and a list of registered handsets is displayed.
- 6. Press $\mathbf{A} \mathbf{\nabla}$ to select one of the handsets that you want to de-register.
- 7. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

8.2.6 Set the Flash Time

The default flash time is best suitable for your country and network operator. It is unlikely that you should need to change this setting unless advised to do so.

- 1. Press **MENU/OK** and \checkmark to select **SETTINGS**.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select FLASH TIME.
- Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select the desired flash time (SHORT=100ms, MEDIUM=300ms, LONG=600ms).
- 4. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

8.2.7 Set the Dial Mode

The default dial mode is best suitable for your country and netw ork operator. It is unlikely that you should need to change this setting unless advised to do so.

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select SETTINGS.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select DIAL MODE.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select the desired dial mode (TONE or PULSE).
- 4. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

8.2.8 Set the Key Tone

The key tone is a confirmation beep when you press any key. It is set on by default, but can be turned off, if desired.

- 1. Press **MENU/OK** and $\blacktriangle \forall$ to select **SETTINGS**.
- Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select KEY TONE.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ON or OFF.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

8.2.9 Change the System PIN

- 1. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/\forall to select **SETTINGS**.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select CHANGE PIN.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and you are requested to enter the 4-digit system PIN.
- 4. Enter the old system PIN.
- 5. Press MENU/OK and enter the new system PIN.
- 6. Press MENU/OK and enter the new system PIN again.
- 7. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

8.2.10 Set the Memory Keys

There are three photo speed dial memory keys 1, 2, and 3 and 1 speed dial memory key M4 on the right side of the telephone base for you to store frequent use numbers.

After a number is stored in any of these memory keys, you can simply press once on one of these memory keys to dial out to the number stored in it directly.


Using the base:


- 1. In idle mode, enter the telephone number you want to store.
- 2. <u>Press and hold</u> any of the memory keys until you hear the confirmation tone to indicate the number has been stored.

To insert a photo:

You can insert a desired photo into the compartment of the three photo speed dial memory keys 1, 2, and 3, or write the contact name on the photo speed dial card.

- 1. Crop your desired photo to the size as indicated below.
- 2. Put the cropped photo into the photo speed dial compartment. Then flip dow n the photo speed dial compartment cover.





8.3 Registration

Your handset and base station is pre-registered. Up to five handsets can be registered to a single base station.

If for some reason, the handset is not registered to the base station (Υ flashes even w hen the handset is near the base station), register your handset according to the follow ing procedure.

On the photo handset

On the \mbox{Base} : First place the base of the AMPLIDECT295 or AMPLIDECT COMBI 295 in Registration mode.

Replace photo handset back on the charging pod, the red LED flashes quickly to indicate registration in process.

You will hear a confirmation beep when the registration process completes. It takes up to 60 seconds to complete the registration.

Note: if the handset doesn't arrive un registered, please follow this procedure:

 $\label{eq:Handset:Quickly press [VOL+] [SPK] [VOL-] [SPK] [VOL+] [VOL-] [SPK] in idle mode, then HS will have a "Bi,Bi" tone.$

On the standard cordless handset:

- 2. If you have more than one base, press and ▲ ▼ to select the base number from BASE 1, BASE 2, BASE 3 and BASE 4. There will be a ★ behind the current registered base number.
- Press to display "PIN?", enter the 4-digit system PIN for the base (default PIN is 0000).
- 4. Press and the display will show "WAITING".
- 5. At the same time, press **MENU/OK** and **▲/**▼ on the base to select REGISTRATION.
- 6. Press **MENU/OK** to see "PLEASE WAIT" flashing on the base display. After a short delay, if the registration is successful, there will be a confirmation beep, and the handset display will go back to idle mode with the new handset number show n. The base display will also go back to idle mode.
- 7. Press INT/MUTE/CLEAR at any time to cancel.

8.4 Reset Your Phone

You can reset your phone to the default settings. After reset, all your personal settings and call list entries will be deleted, but your phonebook list remains unchanged.

Using the base:

You can reset all of your base settings to their default settings. After a reset, all your personal base settings, call list entries, redial list entries and answering messages will be deleted.

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select SETTINGS. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select BS DEFAULT.
- 2. Press **MENU/OK** and you are requested to enter the 4-digit system PIN.
- 3. Enter the 4-digit system PIN (default PIN is 0000).
- 4. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

9 ANSWERING MACHINE

Your telephone base includes a telephone answ ering machine that records unanswered calls when it is on. The answ ering machine can store up to 59 messages within the maximum recording time of approximately 15 minutes. As well as recording incoming messages, you can record memos for other users of your phone.

9.1 Switching Answering Machine On/Off

Using the base direct key:

You can sw itch on / sw itch off the TAM function by pressing ANS ON/OFF.

Using the base menu:

Alternatively, you can switch the TAMon or off using the base menu.

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to go to TAM ON/OFF.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ON or OFF.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

9.2 Play Messages on TAM

If you have new messages, the display will show e.g. 02/05 MSGS, which means you have 2 new message out of total 5 messages. New messages are played first, and then are saved as old messages, until they are deleted. Old messages are played again after all new messages are played completely.

Using the base direct key:

In idle:

- 1. Press PLAY/STOP to listen to messages and memos.
- 2. Press **PLAY/STOP** if you want to stop the playback.
- 3. Press ◀ once if you want to repeat the current message from the beginning, or press twice to skip back to the previous message during message playback.
- Press ➡ if you want to skip forward to the next message during message playback.
- 5. Press **DELETE** if you want to delete the current message being played.

Using the base menu:

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK to show MSG PLAYBACK.
- 3. Press MENU/OK to start playing back the messages from speakerphone.

9.3 Delete all Messages on TAM

Using the base menu:

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/ \forall to select **DELETE ALL**.
- 3. Press MENU/OK.
- 4. Press MENU/OK again to confirm delete all old messages.

Using the base direct key:

Press and hold DELETE to delete all the old messages.

NOTE:

You cannot delete new messages, so you will have to play them before trying to delete.

9.4 Record Memos on TAM

You can record your memo message for another user. When you record a memo, the message counter will increase by one and the message can be played in the same way as answering machine messages. Memo recording can still function even when the answ ering machine is turned off.

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select MEMO.
- 3. Press **MENU/OK** to start recording the memo, and "RECORDING" is shown on the display.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to save and end your memo recording. The new memo will then play back automatically. Let it play to the end or press MENU/OK again to stop the playback. Or press INT/MUTE/CLEAR at any time to stop the memo without saving it.

9.5 Answering Machine Settings

9.5.1 Set the Answer Mode

By default, the answ er machine is set in ANS&REC mode which allow s callers to leave a message. This mode can be changed to ANSONLY which does not allow callers to leave a message. In that case, your callers will be prompted to call back later. You can select ANS & REC or ANSWER ONLY for the answ ering machine.

Using the base:

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select TAM SETTINGS.
- 3. Press MENU/OK to show ANSWER MODE.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS & REC or ANSWER ONLY.
- 5. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

9.5.2 Set the TAM Language

You can choose the voice prompt language of the answ ering machine from a total of 3 languages French, English and German.

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select TAM SETTINGS.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select TAM LANGUAGE.
- 4. Press **M ENU/OK** and **▲/▼** to select the desired voice prompt language for the answ ering machine.
- 5. Press MENU/OK to confirm

9.5.3 Record your Outgoing Message (OGM)

You can record your ow n OGM for ANS & REC mode or ANSWER ONLY mode. When you record your ow n OGM, it will be used when the answering machine answers

the call. If your personalized OGM is deleted, the pre-set OGM will be restored automatically.

Using the base:

- 1. Press MENU/OK and▲ 😿 to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ★ to select TAM SETTINGS.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲ ▼ to select OGM SETTINGS.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and ★ ★ to select ANS & REC or ANSWER ONLY.
- 5. Press MENU/OK and▲ 🖈 to select RECORD.
- Press MENU/OK to start recording your personalized OGM and "RECORDING" is displayed on the screen.
- Press MENU/OK to stop and save your personalized OGM. Your new saved OGM will playback automatically. Alternatively, press INT/MUTE/CLEAR to return to previous screen without saving the personalized OGM.

9.5.4 Playback the Outgoing Message (OGM)

Using the base direct key:

Press ◀ briefly to listen to the current OGM (ANS & REC or ANSWER ONLY).

Using the base menu:

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select TAM SETTINGS.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select OGM SETTING.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS & REC or ANSWER ONLY.
- 5. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select PLAYBACK.
- Press M ENU/OK to playback your personalized OGM (if you have recorded a personalized OGM before) and "PLAYING OGM" is displayed on the screen.
- 7. Press **MENU/OK** to stop the OGM playback and return to the previous menu.

NOTE:

If a personalized OGM is not recorded before, the pre-set OGM will be played.

9.5.5 Delete a Personalized OGM (SET OGM to DEFAULT)

Using the base:

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select TAM SETTINGS.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select OGM SETTING.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS & REC or ANSWER ONLY.
- 5. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/\forall to select **DEFAULT**.
- 6. Press MENU/OK and enter the 4-digit system PIN (default PIN is 0000).
- 7. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

9.5.6 Set the Answer Delay

You can set the number of rings before the answ ering machine answ ers and starts playing your OGM. You can set the answ ering machine to answ erafter two to eight rings or TIME SAVER.

The TIME SAVER function answers calls after 6 ring signals, until the first new message has been registered - then the answ ering machine sw itches to answering after approximately 2 signals. This is useful when using remote access; if you call up the answ ering machine and there is no reply after four rings that means there are no messages recorded and you can hang up before you are charged for the call.

Using the base:

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select TAM SETTINGS.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANSWER DELAY.
- 4. Scroll **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle to select the desired answ er delay.
- 5. Press MENU/OK to confirm

9.5.7 Set the Recording Time of Incoming Message

You can set the maximum length of the recording time of the incoming messages.

- 1. Press MENU/OK and A To select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and A To select TAM SETTINGS.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and A To select RECORD TIME.
- 4. Press **MENU/OK** and **M** select your desired recording time.
- 5. Press MENU/OK to confirm

9.5.8 Turn On or Off the Base Screening

You can select to turn on or off the call screening on base. When the answ ering machine is set to ON and when there is an incoming message, the base will start call screening automatically after the preset numbers of rings of answ er delay.

Using the base:

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ★ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ★ to select TAM SETTINGS.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ★ to select BS SCREENING.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and ★ to select ON or OFF.
- 5. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

9.5.9 Change the Compression Rate

Three different compression rates (HIGH, MID and LOW) are provided for you to select different quality levels of recording incoming message. The low er the compression rate, the higher the recording quality level attained, but the shorter the total recording time available.

- Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select TAM SETTINGS.
- Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select COMPRESSION (Available options: HIGH, MEDIUM, or LOW).
- 3. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/\forall to select your desired compression rate.
- 4. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

9.5.10 Activate Remote Access

Your phone lets you check your messages, or otherw ise operate your answering machine, by calling the answering machine w hen you are away from home by entering a 4-digit remote access PIN on a tone-dialing phone. Use the 4-digit remote access PIN code to prevent other people from unauthorized access of your answering machine.

9.5.10.1 Change the 4-Digit Remote Access PIN

Using the base:

- Press MENU/OK and ▲ ▼to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press MENU/OK and ▲ ▼to select TAM SETTINGS.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲ ▼to select CHANGE PIN.
- 4. Press MENU/OK and enter the old PIN (default remote access PIN is 0000).
- 5. Press MENU/OK and enter your new 4-digit PIN.
- 6. Press MENU/OK and enter your new 4-digit PIN again.
- 7. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

9.5.10.2 Activate or Deactivate the Remote access

Using the base:

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/\forall to select **TAM SETTINGS**.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select REMOTE ACC.
- Press M ENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ON or OFF to turn on or off the remote access respectively.
- 5. Press MENU/OK to confirm.

9.5.10.3 Reset TAM to Default Settings

- 1. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select ANS. MACHINE.
- 2. Press **MENU/OK** and \blacktriangle/\forall to select **TAM SETTINGS**.
- 3. Press MENU/OK and ▲/▼ to select TAM DEFAULT.
- 4. Press **MENU/OK** and then enter the correct system PIN (default PIN is 0000).
- 5. Press **MENU/OK** to restore the TAM settings to default.

9.5.10.4 Remote Operations

If you are aw ay from your home, you can call your answ ering machine to sw itch on or off the answ ering machine and listen to your messages remotely using another tone-dialing phone.

- 1. Place a call from a tone-dialing phone.
- 2. When the answ ering machine answ ers the call and starts playing OGM, press **X**.
- 3. Enter the 4-digit Remote Access PIN (default PIN is 0000).
- 4. Press the follow ing keys to carry out your desired function.
